Oliver going to that Wendy's that night protecting all of us from criminals that come from Fort Worth, Texas, or Columbus, Georgia, perhaps Lieutenant Oliver would be with us here today, or perhaps one other thing. If Lieutenant Oliver had followed one of the police department's routine rules, Phillip Workman might not be sitting over there, because what we have is a felon fleeing his felony.

Police department rules say that if an officer receives that this is a felon fleeing a felony, that officer can shoot to kill. Lieutenant Oliver never pulled his pistol until he was shot and sitting down on the pavement. How do we know that?

Harold Davis had pulled up to get something to eat and was getting out of his car and he virtually saw the whole thing. And what did Mr. Davis say in regards to the tussle that he saw take place? Mr. Stoddard gets shot and spins away, Lieutenant Oliver and the defendant.

Was it a thing where they were wrestling over this pistol? No. Was it a thing where the Lieutenant was trying to get the pistol away and there's an accidental discharge?

Mr. Davis got out here, he being Workman and me being Lieutenant Oliver, as if Mr. Davis was standing in that chair approximately two feet away with one of the Lieutenant's hands raised up, I believe, in this position (demonstrating),

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approximately two feet away is what I believe Mr. Davis said and a shot was fired. He coolly and deliberately pulled this trigger and sent the bullet down this barrel and into the body of that man right there.

You heard Doctor Bell indicate the cause of death was a gunshot wound that entered here and exited a little higher up around the back in the rear side. Doctor Bell indicated that due to the type of wound and the blood being in the brain that the individual would stay alive, I believe, he said four minutes. He would be conscious and able to function. I asked the question, a person with a wound like that, would that person be able to, in your expert opinion, fire off six rounds from a pistol? And he indicated yes.

The State submits that what happened is after Workman shot Lieutenant Oliver, Lieutenant Oliver is down, he's
pulling his pistol, and if you will recall, Mr. Davis said as
the Lieutenant was falling, he was going for his pistol. He's
sitting on the ground; he's got this wound through him and he
can't shoot as clearly as if he could if he were standing on
the firing range, and he shoots this pistol six times. He
never hits the defendant. Ferhaps he hit that truck and perhaps he didn't. No telling where those shells went, the bullets
out of the gun.

But the bullets that he fired, these six blank cartridges remained in the gum, whereas in the automatic

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
