	Judge Phillip Robinson is a lifelong Nashvillian having graduated from Montgomery Bell Academy in 1968, the University of Tennessee in 1972 and the University College of Law in 1975.
	In November, 1975, he became an associate of the Norman Law Offices and practiced there for 26 years. Judge Robinson's early practice included personal injury, criminal, probate and domestic relations matters. For the past 25 years, he practiced family law exclusively involving divorce and custody actions, modifications of parenting time, child support and alimony, prenuptial agreements, orders of protection and Juvenile Court parentage, custody and dependent/neglect actions. In March, 2001, Judge Robinson, Judge Philip E. Smith and Teresa Webb Oglesby opened their own office.
	Judge Robinson is a member of the Nashville Bar Association and the Tennessee Bar Association. He is a Fellow of the Nashville Bar Foundation. Judge Robinson is recognized in Best Lawyers in America and Mid-South Super Lawyers. He is board certified as a Family Law Trial Advocate by the National Board of Trial Advocacy and is a Fellow of the American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers which is an organization of the nation's preeminent domestic lawyers.
	In March, 2012, Judge Robinson was appointed to fill the Third Circuit Court vacancy. In August, 2012, he was elected by the citizens of Davidson County to serve for the remaining two years on that judicial term. Judge Robinson was re-elected for an eight year term in 2014.
	HONORABLE PHILIP E. SMITH Fourth Circuit Court Judge
	Judge Philip E. Smith graduated from the University of Tennessee College of Law in May of 1988. In October of 1988, Judge Smith went to work for the Office of the District Attorney General for the Twentieth Judicial District. In September 1990, Judge Smith joined the Norman Law Offices and remained there until March of 2001. In March 2001, Judge Smith, along with Phillip Robinson and Teresa Webb Oglesby began their own law practice.
	Judge Smith's practice consisted primarily of family law matters, including divorce, child support matters, custody and visitation matters, antenuptial agreements, post-nuptial agreements, grandparent visitation cases and domestic mediation.
	In 2008, Judge Smith was inducted as a "Fellow" in the American Academy of Matrimonial Lawyers. In 2007 and 2008, Judge Smith was listed in "Best Lawyers in America" in the Family Law category. In 2008, "Mid-South Super Lawyers" listed Judge Smith, along with 24 other lawyers from the Mid-South (Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee) as a "Super Lawyer" in the Family Law category.

	Judge Smith is currently a member of the Harry Phillips American Inn of Court.
	Judge Smith is a member of the faculty at the Nashville School of Law where he teaches Domestic Relations.
	On March 18, 2009, Judge Smith was appointed by Governor Phil Bredesen as Judge of the Fourth Circuit Court of Davidson County, Tennessee, to replace Judge Muriel Robinson upon her retirement. In August of 2014, Judge Smith was elected to an eight year term.
	Special Master Teresa Oglesby Third Circuit Court for Davidson County, Tennessee
	Ms. Oglesby was employed with Davidson County Child Support Services from 1994 through 1998. After leaving this employment, she became an associate of the Norman Law Offices and practiced there for approximately two years. She then moved to the L&C Tower in downtown Nashville where she practiced family law exclusively with Judge Philip E. Smith and Judge Philip Robinson for approximately thirteen years. In 1999, Ms. Oglesby became a Rule 31 Mediator and became well recognized in this field, subsequently devoting the majority of her practice to domestic mediations.
	In September, 2012, Ms. Oglesby was appointed by Judge Robinson as Special Master to the Third Circuit Court for Davidson County and retains this position to present. In her position as Special Master, Ms. Oglesby conducts Judicial Settlement Conferences in an effort to resolve some or all issues prior to a contested trial and assists Judge Robinson in the Courtroom as needed.
	Special Master Oglesby is an active member of the Tennessee Bar Association and the Nashville Bar Association.

	Stephanie J. Williams is a graduate of Trevecca Nazarene University (BA) and the University of Tennessee-Knoxville (JD). Her legal career began in 2000 at the Law Office of Manson, Jones & Associates. Recognizing the importance and need for affordable, as well as effective, representation in the area of family law, she established the Family Justice Center in 2006 through a grant which she was awarded to assist low income families in family law cases. In January of 2014, she began her role as Special Master of the Fourth Circuit Court of Davidson County, Tennessee after being appointed by Judge Philip E. Smith, where she currently serves. Special Master Williams is currently an executive board member for the Napier Looby Bar Association and on the board of the Women's Political Collaborative. She can also be found volunteering in many capacities in and around the Nashville community, including, but not limited to, the homeless community, domestic abuse victims, and low income families in need.
